#### SUNSET TOURS RESUME

The next 2018 AMMPT "Classics of the Silver Screen" presentation will be the 1954 20th Century Fox release "Three Coins in the Fountain". Starring Clifton Webb and Dorothy McGuire and all-star cast the film is about three American women working in Rome who dream of finding romance in the Eternal City. Each experiencing a few bumps in their journeys to romance. The Jule Styne composed song "Three Coins in the Fountain" received the Academy Award for Best Original Song in 1955. The film grossed \$12 million worldwide.

Missing parts were sourced from overseas and wiring checked.



## IN FOCUS PRESENTATION – WEDNESDAY 18th APRIL 2018 7.30pm

Richard Rennie will present - **Two Ears Good (1881 – On).** The history of stereophonic sound. Hear the story of Opera Garnier's Theatrephone of 1881, the first stereophonic broadcasts in Western Australia in 1925, the stereophonic music of Fantasia in 1940, and the accidental stereophonic recordings in 1941. Experience some unusual early stereophonic records and rare quadraphonic records. Learn the difference between Binaural recordings and Stereophonic recordings. Hear an original Cook Binaural Records being played on a twin-arm record player; and for the first time a stereophonic Edison cylinder record. Bring your own ears. Venue – Fred Bell RSL Hall in Fred Bell Parade, St. James.

FILM LIBRARY – After many years of daunting slog the film library volunteers have nearly finished the first stage of building AMMPT's unique collection. With less than 300 films yet to be examined and reported on, the processing of the State Library collection will have been done.
